


SURREY'S HERITAGE TREES



Trees are an important part of Surrey's heritage. We are proud to have over 200 trees with heritage status in Surrey! Use this map to explore just a sample of a growing group of heritage trees in Surrey.

1 American Elm

8135 132 St

At 4 metres (over 13 feet) around, it might take your whole family to give this wide tree a hug!

2 Oak, Tulip and Elm Trees

9750 140 St | South side along hospital parking lot on Green Timbers Way

Discover the oak, tulip, and elm trees that live along Green Timbers Way. Stop and admire the 70-year-old American elm tree off of 140 St that welcomes visitors to this row of heritage trees. Make sure to visit the Surrey Nature Centre to continue your outdoor adventure!

3 Common Whitebeam and Weeping Elm

14255 96 Ave | Surrey Nature Centre

This common whitebeam stands at an impressive 19 metres (62 feet) tall. In the spring, small white flowers line its branches, followed in the fall by bright orange-red berries. If you look closely, you may spot birds perched on its branches. The weeping elm is a smaller tree at 5 metres (16.5 feet) tall, but it is still mighty! This 70-year-old tree produces a lush, cascading display of bright green leaves in the fall.

4 English Oak

9012 160 St

At over 80 years old, this English oak is marvelous to look at, but is also an important part of the local ecosystem. Look for wildlife foraging for acorns, birds on its on branches, and squirrels climbing up the trunk.

5 Douglas-fir

16613 Old McLellan Rd | By the heritage church

Admire this row of majestic Douglas-firs that line the boulevard. Can you guess which ones are over 100 years old? Some were planted in 1915.

Most of these trees are identified by a stone or plaque near the base of the tree.

6 Wych Elm

17900 20 Ave | Redwood Park

Originally planted as seed around 1893, this now towering tree is known for its foliage, with its leaves turning a beautiful golden-yellow colour in the fall. In the spring and summer, relax under its bright green leaves while admiring the beauty of Redwood Park.

7 Douglas-fir

15100 22 Ave | Semiahmoo Trail

You'll recognize this massive tree as soon as you see it. With a graceful curve, the trunk soars skyward to a staggering 48 metres (157 feet) tall.

8 Horse Chestnut

12645 14B Ave

This huge tree stands in front of the John Horner House, a registered and protected heritage site in Surrey.

9 English Oak

19340 88 Ave | Port Kells Park

This tree is one of the 29 heritage trees in Port Kells Park. At over 70 years old, it isn't the oldest tree in the park, but its size, shape, and setting make it one of the most eye-catching.

10 Royal Oak Trees

King George Boulevard between 11 to 34 Avenue

In 1937, these red oak trees were grown from seedlings sent to Surrey from England. In 2008, The Heritage Advisory Commission collected their acorns, and 11 more trees were planted. Meet this family of trees along King George Boulevard from 11 to 34 Avenue.
