getting to know surrey

How big is Surrey?

Surrey is really big. We are the largest city and municipality in Metro Vancouver.

Extending over 316 square kilometres, Surrey is almost the size of Vancouver, Burnaby and Richmond combined (which is about 335 square kilometers).

How many people live in Surrey?

In 2024, the number of people living in Surrey was estimated at 615,000. About 10,000 people (enough people to fill a good-size town) move to Surrey every year, making it one of the fastest growing cities in Canada.

How many parks are there in Surrey?

We have over 800 parks in Surrey for people, plants, and animals! 570+ of our parks are meant for people to play, socialize, or relax. These parks have a special feature like a playground, water park, sport court, or trail (to name a few!). 207 parks are protected for natural area only. That means people are not invited in and we protect the trees, plants, animals, and streams in these parks.

How much park land and green space does Surrey have?

Surrey has over 2,872 hectares (7097 acres) of parkland. One acre of land is equal to the size of half a soccer field. This means Surrey has over 3,500 soccer field sizes of park land and green space.



Our History

We would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge that Surrey is situated on the traditional, ancestral, unceded territories of the Salish Peoples, including the **se'mya'me** (Semiahmoo), **q'*a:n'\(^1\)a-n'** (Kwantlen), and **qic'a-y'** (Katzie), land-based Nations. The City recognizes the importance of honouring the Indigenous heritage of this place.

People from around the world have chosen Surrey as the city in which they want to live. We are proud of our ethnic and cultural diversity which brings together many different traditions and languages from other countries.

did you know?

The City of Surrey is so big we have six unique town centres. Each is a distinct neighbourhood that act as a community hub—Fleetwood, City Centre/Whalley, Guildford, Newton, Cloverdale and South Surrey.



your city government

Canada has three levels of government:

Canada Federal Government

The federal government in Ottawa takes care of issues the whole country faces. Things such as the Navy, the Air Force, and trade and friendships with other countries.

British Columbia Provincial Government

The provincial government in Victoria takes care of things such as health care, education and transportation, including public transit (buses and SkyTrain), major highways and bridges.

Surrey Local Government

Local governments, such as City of Surrey, are responsible for things closer to home, such as making sure we have a clean and green city, safety issues (police and fire departments) and fun things like your playgrounds and swings in parks.

Who takes care of Surrey residents?

Mayor and Council take good care of Surrey residents. Surrey City Council is made up of eight councillors and a mayor. Mayor and Council are elected by Surrey residents every four years.

When can I vote for Surrey City Council?

When you turn 18 years old, you can vote for the people you think will do the best job of running the city you live in.


What's a Bylaw?

City Council creates bylaws, which are the rules of living in the city, making sure the city is run smoothly. For example, the Unsightly Premises Bylaw ensures that your neighbourhood is clean and safe.

Learn the Municipal Talk

City Hall has a unique way of talking. Here are some commonly used words.

Bylaw – a rule made by Council to help run the city.

City - a large town.

City Council – the Mayor and eight councillors are elected by residents to help run the city.

Councillor – a local person elected every four years to be a part of City Council.

Mayor – a local person elected every four years to head City Council and council meetings.

Municipality – a town or city with its own government.

Rezoning – when an area of land is changed from one category to another. Council must pass a bylaw before any changes are made.

Zoning – areas of land divided into sections. Surrey has four major zones:

- farmland
- commercial
- houses
- industrial

how city hall works

The mayor and eight councillors are picked to make up Surrey City Council by the people who live in Surrey. We call this an election. Elections for a new Mayor and Council take place every four years.

You will be able to vote when you turn 18 years old. Until then, you can participate by reminding your parents to vote every time there's an election.





The City of Surrey mayor is:

What does the mayor do?

The mayor is the leader at City council meetings. They are usually the person you'll read about in the newspaper, see on television or hear on the radio. The mayor answers questions and makes announcements on major events that happen in our city.

The mayor represents the people of the city. At special events like Canada Day, the mayor welcomes visitors and important people from other cities in Canada, even around the world.

What do City councillors do?

City councillors take care of the people that live in Surrey. Councillors are neighbourhood leaders and they help make decisions on how to run the city. These decisions are important in maintaining a clean and safe city for us to live in.


When there is a decision to be made, City councillors vote on what they think is best for the people that live in Surrey.

What do the staff at City Hall do?

People who work at City Hall make sure the decisions that City Council make are followed. City staff work hard to make sure the people who live in Surrey are safe, informed and proud of the city in which they live.

What does the City Manager do?

Because running the city is such a big job, City Council hires someone to help them – someone who works every day at City Hall and who knows all about making a city operate smoothly. This person is called the City Manager.

The City Manager's job is to make sure the City is taking care of the needs of everyone living in Surrey and all City services and programs run smoothly. All City departments report to the City Manager.

Corporate Services

Bylaw and Licensing Services is responsible for enforcing the hundreds of bylaws, or City rules, that govern the conduct or all residents and visitors of the city.

Human Resources hires the best people to work for the City and creates a safe and supportive work environment for staff.

Information Technology (IT) provides the right technology and information to make sure the city's work is done efficiently and effectively.

Legislative Services prepares council meeting agendas and preserves City records. They also arrange elections for Mayor and Council.

Marketing and Corporate Communications helps promote all City programs and initiatives by providing advice to departments and managing the website and social channels.

Finance

The Finance Department manages the City's money. One of their main tasks is to create a budget. This budget shows how much money should be spent on different City services that help the people living in Surrey. The money needed to run the city comes from taxes. Every year, people who own property or businesses must pay these taxes.

Social Infrastructure & Community Investments

This department is made up of teams that support the social well-being and community safety in Surrey, including job creation and business development, housing support, and Indigenous relations.

The Technology Division maintains over 4000 computers used by staff throughout the City.

planning and development

Surrey is one of the fastest growing cities in Canada. We are almost three times the size of Vancouver and that's a large area of land to work with.

What do planners do?

The people who work in this department are called planners. Planners imagine what Surrey will look like in years to come and follow decisions made by City Council on growth and development in the city.

How do planners decide what goes where?

All of Surrey is divided into land categories showing what can be built in different areas of the city. Planners use these categories to decide what goes where. For example, schools and parks go near where the houses are but not warehouses and factories.

Here are four types of categories in Surrey:


Housing – where you live, play and go to school.

Farmland – where farmers grow fruits and vegetables.

Commercial – where you find stores, offices and shopping centres.

Industrial – where people work in warehouses and factories.

The Engineering Department does so much around the city to make sure we can get around safely, have clean water to drink and use, and keep our city clean.

They build and fix roads so that we can drive, walk, bike or take a bus in the city. They also take care of traffic signals, sidewalks, bike lanes and electric charging stations.

They salt and clear snow from the roads in the winter to keep us safe.

They build pipes so we can get fresh drinking water in our homes, and can remove the dirty water from our sinks and toilets through sewer pipes.

They pick up our garbage and recycling to keep our city clean and planet healthier.

They protect our city from flooding by building dykes and storm drains.



Sustainability Charter

Sustainability is important to us! This is why the City has a 40 year plan to make Surrey a thriving, green and welcoming city.

This plan is shown in a document called the Sustainability Charter 2.0. The charter is like our map to follow to make sure all City decisions keep us on track to become the kind of vibrant city shown in the plan.

Surrey residents, staff, Mayor and Council and others involved all work together to update the charter and make sure it is in step with our community's values. The City and the community must work as a team to achieve the big goals set in the charter!

The Sustainability Charter 2.0 is one of several plans that keep the City on track like the Official Community Plan, Poverty Reduction Plan and Surrey Transportation Plan. Each plan complements one another and guides the City as we keep improving Surrey and make it one of the best places to live, work and visit.

Smoke alarm tips

Ask your parents to check your smoke alarms to see if they're working.

Also remind your parents to maintain smoke alarms by:

- Testing your smoke alarms once a month
- Changing the battery once a year
- Cleaning your smoke alarms with a vacuum twice a year.

We have all seen the big red fire trucks and heard their sirens wailing as they respond to a 9-1-1 call for help. What an exciting but dangerous job firefighters have as they protect lives and property.

Surrey Fire Services is the second largest fire department in British Columbia. We have 390 career firefighters and 15 fire halls that are staffed 24 hours a day. We have additional support from 22 on-call firefighters that are alerted using a phone app when they are needed.

Every year, our firefighters respond to more than 30,000 emergency calls, which include medical emergencies, car accidents, structure fires, outdoor burning and grass fires, chemical spills, and fire alarm calls.

Surrey Fire Service also works with volunteer organizations and support groups who come together to prepare for emergencies like earthquakes and floods through the Surrey Emergency Program. Surrey Fire Service and our many community partners work hard to help keep our city and citizens safe.


Police Services

Police Services are like the safety superheroes in our neighborhoods.

They keep us safe by making sure everyone follows the rules, helping people when they're in trouble, and catching bad guys who break the law.

They patrol our streets, respond when we need help, and work hard to make sure our communities are safe and happy places to live.

Sometimes they also teach us how to stay safe and be good citizens. So basically, they're the ones who make sure everything runs smoothly and everyone can feel secure.

You and your friends can ride the waves and experience the thrill of our awesome waterslides at the City's pools.

Feel the glide of the ice at one of Surrey's arenas, learn how to draw or watch a performance at the Surrey Arts Centre, count the different species of birds at Blackie Spit or step back in time and learn how to make hand-churned butter at the Historic Stewart Farm.

The Special Events team puts on five major events in Surrey each year including Party for Planet, Surrey Spark Stages, Surrey Canada Day, Surrey Fusion Festival and Surrey Tree Lighting Festival.

Overall, Healthy Communities helps make our community a better, healthier, and more enjoyable place to live.




surrey libraries
